Introduction     and     Background	A well-researched document constructed in such a way as to be easily navigable, readable and understandable by lay people

	with clear objectives and lucid and creditable methodology for implementation.
2. Shropshire Local Plan (Core Strategy and SAMDev Plan) Context	Well defined objectives with a clear roadmap to sustainable and achievable goals.
3. Vison, Issues and Objectives	The plan shows a clear understanding of local requirements and the needs of an old, mainly agricultural economy, struggling to shake off this dependency. The problems of only two major employers and the imminent demise of a substantial contributor, the army, to the local community need to be urgently addressed.
4. Planning Policies	The main policies are well conceived and achievable. The proposed increase in housing, whilst laudable, cannot be allowed to proceed apace without the necessary improvements to the local infrastructure, paying special attention to medical, dental, and educational facilities. The ease of commutability to Stoke, Crewe, Stafford, Wolverhampton, Telford and Shrewsbury within 40 minutes, Liverpool, Birmingham, and Manchester within 75, and four international airports and London Euston easily within 100 minutes, makes the town an ideal dormitory for professionals but the shopping scene suffers from this ease of accessibility to close superior facilities a short car ride away.
5. Delivering the Plan	For many years the towns sporting and recreational facilities, formal and informal, have fallen far short of even the minimum N.P.F.A. 6 acre standards and the proposed move of Greenfields sports fields provision, following its development for housing, to Longford is to be warmly welcomed but this must surely be <b>the principal priority</b> . The building of houses on the other proposed peripheral sites at either end of the bypass should be phased to follow completion of proper recreational facilities to meet the requirements of the present population and the estimated increase to over 15,000.
Other Comments	The position of the majority of the proposed housing at considerable distance from most schools, with awkward and sometimes dangerous access ways emphasizes the need for the implementation of Shropshire's "safe walkways to schools strategy".  The Safer Routes to Schools National Partnership policies would be especially successfully addressed by utilization of the old railway line adjacent to Greenfields and other local authority property. This proposal, coupled with the old railway lines utilization as part of the provision of informal recreation, wildlife friendly green breathing space, is an ideal use for this

substantial area (2.7 acre) especially given the owners willingness to co-operate and assist.
