

Applicant's Statement for Weston Woods

We strongly believe that all the footpaths around Weston woods (see map attached) that are already in maps, GPS and walking guides should be added to the Definitive Map of public footpaths.

All these maps and social historical accounts show that the use of these footpaths and tracks inside Weston woods were essential in the every day lives of local villagers for centuries. Even to this day several people still use them to visit friends and relatives around Wem, Lee Brockhurst, Moston and Stanton.

The information on the Geocaching map is very relevant because it shows a constant traffic of walkers through the woods. Their dated log entries are first accounts of the general activity in the woods. Some of the entries describe the paths, tracks, lanes and other information. The North Shropshire Hunt uses the woods quite often. Also when Tilhill was going to be in the woods logging or clearing the cryn (restricted byway) they would put notices up to let people know (See below). The restricted byway and the rest of the tracks and paths are used by hundreds of people every year and not only by the locals. Tilhill always keep them clear and in the aftermath of a storm they will come and move any fallen down trees.

The Potteries Orienteering Club's records show that local landowners were happy to let people use the woods for certain activities. It shows that Tilhill knew that other people walked the woods and that while these events took place other walkers were also in the woods.

Through their surveying, the maps show exactly the location of all the footpaths and tracks. These footpaths and tracks have not change since our earliest map shows in 1880 nor have been diverted in any way.

Top track could well fit into the category of common land and historically the adjacent fields had several owners. According to the Land Registry Top Track is not registered to anyone. Therefore the access can't be restricted or blocked by Mr. Muhiddin.

All the correspondence with the new owner shows an unwillingness to negotiate any access to the woods. Mr. Stock, his manager/handyman has confirmed that the three gates are coming back to the restricted byway as soon as the animals arrive and they are going to be closed.

From the A49 are several public footpaths that lead directly into the woods and eventually into Weston under Redcastle. Just before they enter the woods they are recorded as public footpaths and once inside they are just footpaths. Nevertheless people still have used them as an extension of the public footpaths.

All of this evidence shows that Weston woods are to this day very popular with walkers and historically even had a couple of Roman roads through it.


